VCC is prepared to help members with casting their Nov 5th Election ballot. What we can do: 1. Deliver your signed and sealed ballot to EITHER the Post Office or a Red Ballot Box on or before 8PM, November 5th

2. Take you to the Clark County Elections Office 1408 Franklin Street Vancouver, to cast your ballot in person

YOUR SERVICE REQUESTS: please be aware of the following:

Villages Clark County is experiencing an increase in service requests, especially for transportation. Remember we cannot GUARANTEE that a volunteer will be available to meet your request. So far, we have been able to meet your requests 96% of the time. All Members need to have a backup plan for every transportation request.

WORDS TO THE WISE:

- When you call in with your request TOMORROW is the earliest that a volunteer will know of it.
- Volunteers NEED 3-4 Business days ADVANCED notice. So that means 4-5 Business days from date of the call.
- Calls for a Monday ride, should be made NO LATER than the prior Tuesday before
- Calls for a Tuesday ride, should be made NO LATER than the prior Wednesday before
- Calls for a Wednesday ride, should be make NO LATER than the prior Thursday before
- Calls for a Thursday ride should be made NO LATER than the prior Friday before

• Calls for Fridays, should be made NO LATER than Monday of that same week.

VCC Drivers get booked early! So, they may NOT be available when you call. Remember THE EARLY BIRD GETS THE WORM!

TIP: Our computer system will STORE your request until 21 days prior. THEN it will be sent daily until there is a volunteer. SO, YOU CAN REQUEST RIDE MONTHS IN ADVANCE. Our computer system will 'release' them when the date is close.

Senior Scam Alerts Series by Aura

This month we are focusing on reverse mortgage scams. Many seniors would have built equity in their homes that they want to turn into a reliable and steady income. Reverse mortgages are available to

homeowners over the age of 62 as a way to access their home equity.

But scammers target the elderly with billboards, ads, and fliers for reverse mortgage scams. They'll claim to be helping you get access to your equity. But in reality, they either steal the money or even commit deed fraud and "steal" your home.

Here are a few other variations of a reverse mortgage scam:

- Mortgage relief: Seniors in need of financial aid might want to use a reverse • mortgage to avoid foreclosure. Scammers target them with claims of fast approval on loans in exchange for an upfront fee.
- Fraudulent contractors: Sometimes scammers will come to your home and offer free consultations. They'll convince elderly homeowners to take out a reverse mortgage and pay for pricey and unnecessary repairs or home "updates."

Warning signs of reverse mortgage scams:

- High-pressure sales tactics that try to get you to consent to a reverse mortgage without doing your due diligence.
- Someone claims that they need power of attorney in order to finalize a reverse mortgage.
- Contractors or vendors suggest that you take out a reverse mortgage to pay for costly repairs. •

What to Do If You Fall

- Whether you are at home or somewhere else, a sudden fall can be startling and upsetting. If you do fall, stay as calm as possible.
- Take several deep breaths to try to relax.
- Remain still on the floor or ground for a few moments. This will help you get over the shock of • falling.
- Decide if you are hurt before getting up. Getting up too quickly or in the wrong way could make • an injury worse.
- If you think you can get up safely without help, roll over onto your side. Rest again while your • body and blood pressure adjust. Slowly get up on your hands and knees, and crawl to a sturdy chair.
- Put your hands on the chair seat and slide one foot forward so that it is flat on the floor. Keep the other leg bent so the knee is on the floor. From this kneeling position, slowly rise and turn your body to sit in the chair.
- If you are hurt or cannot get up on your own, ask someone for help or call your local emergency number. If you are alone, try to get into a comfortable position and wait for help to arrive.
- Carrying a mobile or portable phone with you as you move about your house could make it • easier to call someone if you need assistance. An emergency response system, which lets you push a button on a special necklace or bracelet to call for help, is another option.

Clippings from the Garden By Janet Houck

November, 2024



Fall is definitely happening now in Clark County. Where I live, the Oregon White Oaks are dropping their beautiful, nutritious leaves all over the place. In my own yard I am chopping some of them with a leaf vacuum tool which works quite well. I am working on beds one by one by mulching first with one to two inches of compost and then putting a layer of one to two inches of chopped up leaves on top. I'll deal with more leaves at the end of leaf fall. Other than that, I am enjoying all the beautiful color. This year there are few acorns falling. This is a stark change from the mast year we had last year. There were thousands of acorns last year. This year there are tens of acorns.

There are different thoughts about removing all the leaves: if you leave them, then the bad bugs can winter over; on the other hand, if you leave them, then the good bugs can also winter over. Removing the leaves impacts both. I compromise by leaving some.

I cut back the Joe Pye Weed plant to about 12" and leave them through to late spring. The experts say that the tubes of the plants are excellent breeding places for good bugs. I did see the insects around the plants in the spring. I have few to no disease or bad insect problems in this garden.

This is the time of year (and through to early spring) to plant or move trees and shrubs. If that lemon cypress you planted three years ago is too tall, then you can move it to a better place now. If that spirea is just too ugly for you, then you can dig it up, pot it up, and give it away! Someone will like it.

Move container plants to a sheltered place. If you can bring them indoors or are lucky enough to have a potting shed or greenhouse, now is the time to do it. My coleus garden is usually treated as annuals, but if I am diligent, I will take cuttings and pot them up, bring them in the house, and have four-inch plants in the spring to replant. We'll see about that. Stay tuned.

Withhold fertilizer from houseplants from now until mid-March unless they are actively growing. I'm doing an edit on my houseplants, getting rid of a couple of them and will get at least one new one for a new spot in my living room. I'm looking for a tall plant - perhaps a dracena or I'll try a palm.

The Greenstalk vertical planter that I purchased last spring is going great guns. I have impatiens, marigolds, little peppers, strawberries, and basil plants in mine. They are all thriving. Critters are getting to the strawberries before I do for the most part, but we can share.

Bundle up, Buttercup. Winter is on the way!
