

CLIPPINGS FROM THE GARDEN JANUARY 2025

Random Thoughts and Observations on a Late December Day



The New Year is upon us, and I wish you and yours the best year yet. With drought, wildfire, and rainstorms ahead, the future is unknown. But if we are prepared for the future the best we can possibly be, then whatever happens, we can weather the storm.

Enough philosophy. Let's garden.

As I wandered in the backyard last week, I wondered what to do besides pick up the branches and twigs dropped by the trees. What should I cut back now and what should I leave until spring happens? How many leaves are the correct amount to leave in the perennial beds and how many should I pick up and remove? When should I disconnect the hoses and bring them in? The answer is blowing in the wind? Maybe.

I did pick up the branches and twigs and this morning there are more.

I did remove the leaves that were packed too solid, and I ruffled up the rest so the soil can breathe freely. I did not take in the hoses yet. I will wait until a freeze threatens.

The wind doesn't blow much at my house, so that will not help or hurt.

The lawns are free of leaves. There are too many leaves stacked up in the back so most of them must be removed to a composting site. The driveway is looking a tad awful so a cleanup there is in order. I guess power washing is the best, but I'm not sure when to do it - possibly wait for a couple of months on that one. Oh, and there are bits of moss growing in the divisions of the concrete on the driveway. I'll get those out with some sort of tool. The moss growing on rocks in the perennial beds and on random brick and stones looks fabulous. I'll leave all that.

The bird feeders are busy, busy, busy. I have two squirrel-proof feeders: one with sunflower chips and the other with black oil sunflower seeds. The third feeder is a lovely, yellow-topped Nigel thistle seed feeder for the goldfinches and their friends. Thanks, Phyllis. There are also two insect habitat structures that look like they have lots of inhabitants.

The squirrels try to invade the feeders, but they give up and just eat what has dropped on the ground. They are not as obvious this time of year. Up in the large oak tree there is one dray, a squirrel nest. Thanks for that word, Beth. Earlier in the fall I watched the squirrels grab a mouthful of leaves and run up the tree. Such fun to watch them.

Poinsettias are seasonal and a great gift. Just where to put them so they are happiest is sometimes a problem. I have discovered that a bright but not direct light place that stays relatively cool works best. I have them in a room that gets some morning sun, has a tall ceiling, and has big windows. They are doing really well here. I just need to remember to water them.

The days are getting longer now, but the really cold weather is ahead of us. Be vigilant. Garden on!
