CLIPPINGS FROM THE GARDEN April 2025

Trying to figure out just what to do in the garden these days is hard. There is just so much. The best way for me to figure this out is to do a Walk About. With clipboard and pen in hand, hopefully not dodging rain or snow, I bundle up and go outside. Walking the yard, front, sides, and back, I look hard. I consider the eyes as an important tool. Just look at things, don't try to figure out anything, just look. After a few minutes then start the list. It doesn't matter how long or short the list is, just write it down. There might be ten things, there might be 40 things, it just doesn't matter.

Then, back inside, where it is warm and toasty and that cup of mint tea or even a lovely glass of Merlot awaits, you prioritize. It doesn't have to be perfect; this is the first draft. Write in pencil if that makes you feel better.

Looking at the first five items, pick one. Only one. Find your other tools, consider the weather, and get to it. Just focus on one thing. Maybe it will take 15 minutes, perhaps it is a 4-hour job that will be done over the course of a couple of days. The hard thing for me is to just stick to that one job and finish it.



Yesterday, my job was to prune the hydrangeas. It is a one hour or so job. Easy peasy. But as I walk out into the yard, I see (not even on my clipboard list) an Aphrodite Sweetshrub whose deciduous branches have grown out into the pathway. I have to talk to myself to make myself not work on that one. Hydrangeas, that is what you are doing today, Janet, Hydrangeas. Focus.

Yeah, that is a tough one for me out in the garden. But I was a good girl and I did focus and I did finish the hydrangeas. But right after that I cut back that shrub that was trying to take over the pathway,

If I'm really being diligent, I will do this Walk About once a month or so. It really helps.

Here is the list of Tasks for April from the Washington State University Master Gardeners of Clark County:

April

- Remove and destroy tent caterpillar larvae and nests.
- Knock aphids off roses with a stream of water.
- Set out transplants of hardy annuals such as primroses*, dusty miller and pansies. Direct sow snapdragons, sweet alyssum, cornflower, clarkia, calendula, larkspur, and Shirley poppy.
- Plant dahlias, ranunculus, gladiolus, iris and cannas.
- Dispose of fallen camellia blossoms to control the spread of botrytis or petal blight.
- Control brown rot on nectarines, apricots, peaches and cherries.
- Control spittlebugs, aphids and slugs on strawberries.
- Protect dogwood trees from anthracnose.
- Use floating row covers to protect plants in the cabbage family from egg laying by cabbage root maggot flies.
